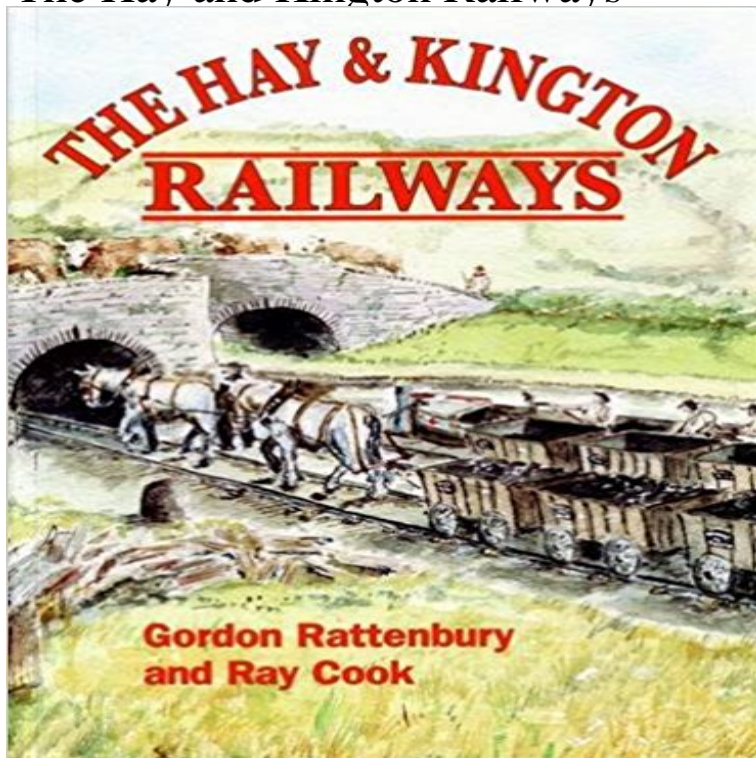


The Hay and Kington Railways



Fascinating history of the two horse-drawn railways that once served Hay-on-Wye and Kington. The Hay Railway and the Kington Railway were the longest railways (36 miles) in the UK until the opening of the Grand Junction Railway in 1837. The railways served the Welsh border area for over 40 years, hauling coal and iron from the Brecknock & Abergavenny Canal to Hay and Kington. With 14 maps.
